Virtual Communities

New communities of physically remote people are forming in the copper and optic cables that wrap around the globe. Ideas are exchanged; business is executed; information is passed; and, sometimes, relationships develop. All through words on screens.

BECAUSE I am a writer, I used to spend my days alone in my room with my typewriter, my words, and my thoughts. On occasion, I ventured outside to interview people or to find information. After work, I would reenter the human community, via my neighborhood, my family, my circle of personal and professional acquaintances. But I was isolated and lonely during the working day, and my work did not provide any opportunity to expand my circle of friends and colleagues.

For the past two years, however, I have participated in a wide-ranging, intellectually stimulating, professionally rewarding, and often intensely emotional exchange with dozens of new friends and hundreds of colleagues. And I still spend my days in a room, physically isolated. My mind, however, is linked with a worldwide collection of like-minded (and not-so-like-minded) souls: My virtual community. If you get a computer and a modem, you can join us.

A virtual community is a group of people who may or may not meet one another face to face, and who exchange words and ideas through the mediation of computer bulletin boards and networks. Like any other community, it is also a collection of people who adhere to a certain (loose) social contract, and who share certain (eclectic) interests. It usually has a geographically local focus, and often has a connection to a much wider domain. The local focus of my virtual community, The Whole Earth 'Lectronic Link (aka "The WELL") is the San Francisco Bay Area; the wider locus consists of tens of thousands of other sites around the world, and hundreds of thousands of other communitarians, linked via exchanges of messages into a meta-community known as the Usenet.

The existence of computer-linked communities was predicted twenty years ago by J.C.R. Licklider, who set in motion the research that resulted in the creation of the first such community, the ARPAnet:

"What will on-line interactive communities be like?" Licklider wrote, in 1968: "In most fields they will consist of geographically separated members, sometimes grouped in small clusters and sometimes working individually. They will be communities not of common location, but of common interest. . . . My friends and I are part of the future that Licklider dreamed about, and we can attest to the truth of his prediction that "life will be happier for the on-line individual because the people with whom one interacts most strongly will be selected more by commonality of interests and goals than by accidents of proximity."

I work with a computer now, instead of a typewriter, so it is easy for me to drop into my electronic watering hole without leaving my chair. My community is both a sacred place, in the sense that I visit it for the sheer pleasure of communicating with my new-found friends, and a practical instrument in the sense that I use

The Psychosocial dimension

- **Identity** In the context of this course, the issue of identity could be defined as looking at what will shape the relationship of the individual to the society, the state, technology or the person.
- Community - people or groups that communicate in a shared time and/or space
- **Virtual Community** is a group of individuals that although interactions have been primarily through the internet (or another alternative) to face to face communication have developed connections comparable to the feelings that exist between members of traditional communities. The term was first coined by Howard Rheingold in an article he wrote for the *Whole Earth Review*.
- **Hippies**--free-thinking individuals of the 1960s and 1970 that created a unique culture of their own. The *Whole Earth Catalog*, a kind of manual for and outgrowth of that culture, had a formative affect on the later development of the personal computer and the web, according to Fred Turner, Steve Jobs, and John Markoff.
- **Innovator**--one who creates mechanisms or philosophies based on new ideas and

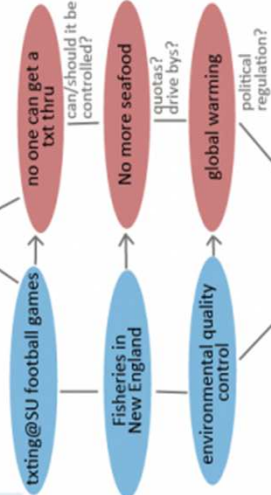


The Commons

“Community” v. “Group” — Survival of the closest

Though not the only question, one question you could ask about a community versus a group is which one survives better. My vote: group. Let's look at both arguments.

Community to me constitutes a collection of individuals with a shared interest. I think of my freshman RA's wanting to “bring a sense of community” to the dorm to test this definition, and it holds up. To me the word “community” evokes the image of something large, as if to tell individuals who are passionate about or believe in certain things that in the vast world exists a bundle or bundles of people who share that same passion or belief. It's almost like an overarching category that you can fit into if you choose to, a category whose components are all connected by the same thread which gives community power in numbers. That's argument 1.

Argument 2: A group is a smaller collection of individuals but more than sharing a common interest, the individuals in a group know one another. Members of a group learn about both their commonalities and their differences. Being closer to each other than people in a community, in my opinion, proves groups are tighter knit and more able to withstand external pressures.

Thoughts? Does close-knit or strength in numbers win?

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The community lexicon -- an exercise in collaboratively creating useful knowledge [edit]

This lexicon is for listing and defining words and phrases from our texts and conversations that we want to know by the time we finish the course. The co-teaching teams take the lead each week by entering a set of words and phrases before, during, and immediately after our class meeting about each set of texts. Co-teaching team also creates two exemplary definitions within 24 hours of our class meeting.

During the week between class meetings, it is up to all of us to fill out the lexicon by collectively editing this page. Add words, define words, correct, edit, expand definitions, add links. Organize the words by topical or alphabetic order. Format the entries. If each member of the Comm 182/282 2013 learning community contributes a small amount, in the aggregate our efforts will add up to something useful for all of us.

It is natural to feel hesitant about editing the words of another learner. The media for collaborative asynchronous editing have not existed until recently, so the practices of collective composition have not been part of schooling. But the Web, Wikipedia, YouTube, and other platforms are strong signals that knowing how to instigate and participate in online social production is an increasingly important literacy
